The Murphy's of Merino



These three ladies were recently staying in Casterton for a few days tidying up some of their family graves. They were formerly Murphy's who were born in Merino. Their father was Frank Murphy who was a share farmer at "Tallisker" and worked at the property called "Ardgarton" which is just out of Digby for a number of years.

They were repairing graves of James Daniel Murphy.

Jim died at Casterton and once lived in View Street and was married to Mary who later married John Minogue, a former resident of Robertson St, Casterton and who now lives at Ballarat. (Mary is also deceased and was buried at Ballarat. They also were placing crosses on Jims parents graves - John Daniel (Jack) and Nancy Murphy who worked at "Retreat" for a number of years. Also being repaired is "Baby Blairs" grave. Visitors may often wonder of the story surrounding this grave which is in the Catholic section and has a heart shaped grave stone surrounded by a small steel enclosure. One of the three ladies in the photo Moya Schaefer (nee Murphy) inherited the christening gown of the baby Blair and also had several of her own children christened in the robe. They also visited the Old cemetery and repaired some family graves.

Obituary of Rex Murphy

Taken from the Casterton News, 1943

Spr T R (Rex) Murphy, whose death was reported last week, was the youngest son of Mrs Murphy of Murray Street Casterton and the late Daniel Murphy.

He took part in the battle of Greece where he was wounded and after spending several months in hospital and convalescent camp, was sent to Java prior to its being captured by the Japanese.

His family last heard from him in February 1942 and in September of that year he was reported a prisoner of war through Tokyo Radio.

No further news had been obtained till the sad news of his death by accident on January 15th was received by his mother on Thursday last.

Brothers and sister are Jack, Frank, Arthur (AIF) and Maisie (Mrs L Hutchins)
