Gordon Malee has lived on the corner across from the railway station for 80 years. In a recent conversation he offered these memories:

During the depression there was no money for entertainment, so the biggest social occasion in town was the arrival of the train. Everyone would walk down to see the people coming and going, the goods being delivered and associated actions. They'd watch the engine being driven up to the turntable, rotated and reattached to the other end to depart.

If anyone in town had sheep or pigs to sell, they would walk them to the station and put them in yards next to the sheds, to be loaded and taken to market.

The train crew would start firing up the engine around 3am, to make sure they had a full head of steam when it was departure time. The neighbours would get an early wake up call around 4 when they let the steam go.

During the war a train arrived at night to take the lighthorse to Melbourne to be sent to war. A number of young children from a certain family across the road snuck out of the window to watch the loading, then snuck back before mum and dad found out what they were up to.
